NEW DIRECTION AT OLF

An exciting change is coming to Our Lady Of Fatima, Peakhurst in 2017.

From February, our parish will be under the direction of the Missionaries Of God's Love (MGL) – an order of priests and brothers based in Canberra.

Incoming Parish Priest, Fr Chris Ryan, visited Peakhurst in October to meet key members of the parish. Fr Chris said four priests from the order will take residence at Penshurst from 1 February 2017, administering both Peakhurst and Penshurst parishes.

At first, Fr Steve Fletcher from MGL will act as Parish Priest while Fr Chris completes his PhD in Theology. Fr Chris is expected to move to the residence at Penshurst in June 2017.

Fr Chris was ordained in 2002 and was responsible for the Icon and Cross Pilgrimage in Australia for World Youth Day 2008.

Who is MGL?

The following is taken from the MGL website:

The Missionaries of God's Love began within the Disciples of Jesus covenant community in Canberra in 1986, under the guidance of Fr Ken Barker.

We are Catholic priests and consecrated brothers together in mission, sharing in the work of evangelisation in a collaborative way with lay people. We always seek to empower the laity in their journey towards holiness and their mission to spread the good news. In return, we draw much strength and support from the lay community which is integral to our identity.

Our ministry always has a particular focus on bringing

the Gospel to Young people and to those who are poor or marginalised.

We currently have missions in Canberra, Melbourne, Darwin and in Manila in the Philippines.

Fresh from the big Parish 50th Anniversary gala in May, the committee decided that a similar, two-event program would enable as many parishioners as possible to attend. On Saturday 22 October, Club Rivers provided a great venue for a relaxed evening, allowing time and space for both formal tributes and informal chats and reminiscing.

As the dinner dance was also the day of Fr John's birthday, a disco party theme evoked the '60s and '70s and the jukebox selections kept many on their feet late into the night. Birthday candles were lit and a cake cut to mark his birthday.

The presentation of a guitar and case, and a substantial gift voucher, was much appreciated by Fr John. He spoke, as always, humbly and from the heart, reflecting on his years at Peakhurst and Penshurst and his plans for 'retirement'. His commitment and compassion to our parish has always been evident; his care in looking to our future is another gift to us all.



There was also a PowerPoint presenation with pictures of Fr John taken throughout his 16 years at Peakhurst.

Those gathered were further entertained by our very own 'Sister Act' with their rendition of *I Will Follow Him* complete with habits and hilarity!

The Celebration Mass on Sunday morning, beautifully prepared by the Liturgy Group, was both prayerful and thankful. The Parish gave thanks for the 16 years that we had been blessed by the ministry of Fr John, and he gave thanks for the home and family he found with us. As always, music provided by the choir, enhanced the liturgy in a wonderful way.

All six hymns were chosen by Fr John: Amazing Grace, We Come to Your Feast, We Remember, I Am the Bread of Life, Will You Love Me and How Great Thou Art. His homily told us on how each of these beautiful hymns was

a reflection of some part of his life and ministry – an inclusive and inspiring homily. To top it all off was a special tribute from Ruth and the choir – An Irish Blessing during which we, the Church family, raised our hands to bless Father John – an emotion-filled moment.

A farewell message to Fr John was delivered on behalf of the Parish by Julia Goff. The same message was delivered at both





the 5pm Saturday and 9.15am Sunday Masses by Maria Vaux and Jenni Payne.

Morning tea, organised by the Welcoming Committee was, as always, a wonderful opportunity to chat and share and to take a moment for personal goodbyes. With a minimum of formality, but hearts full of emotion we said "goodbye, farewell and Amen" to our beloved Fr John.

For 12 weeks throughout terms three and four our parish, through our Lending A Hand Team, has hosted 22 Year 10 students from St Ursula's College Kingsgrove each week for community service.

The girls are only with us for 50 minutes and it is a whirlwind of a 50 minutes but what we have achieved in that time each week has been quite remarkable.

All the girls are delightful, very respectful and willing to embrace whatever is thrown at them.

We have cleaned the pews, scrubbed the tables, washed the playtime equipment and much more.

Under the direction of Julia Goff, the girls made 10 dozen meatballs and over 100 delicious muffins for the St Canice's lunch.

We made toiletry packs for the homeless. Some of which went into St Canice's and the rest went to Orange Sky Laundry. The girls were asked to handwrite a personal message to go in these packs and these were truly thoughtful and beautiful.

The girls made rocky road and muffins then hosted two afternoon teas for the residents of local nursing home, Ferndale Gardens.

The residents arrived on their bus and shuffled into our hall for a lovely afternoon of tea, cakes and conversation. Both parties greatly enjoyed this activity. We also cooked for and hosted an afternoon tea for our CWL, the choir and the Friendship Group organisers. The leaders of all these groups gave a little speech about the impact their community service through their ministry was able to have on others.

Along the way, when they were parked in our carpark collecting, we had a talk from the Red Cross Blood Bank about donating.

The final week was spent hand-making 200 bon bons for our Vinnies hampers. The girls also had a chat from David Payne about the amazing work that SVDP does from our parish.

Overall I think this program exposed the girls to a different side of what it means to go to church and it is hoped that some of them will be inspired by the example set by so many of our wonderful volunteers.

As the only local church in the area that ran the program, and due to its enormous success, we have already been asked to participate again next year which we look forward to doing.


Kathy and Len Dennett are cruising the South Pacific at the same time. Ain't retirement grand!

As we were driving away, with our son Matthew and his wife Jen waving to their "little treasure" from the footpath (probably thinking "my goodness, what have we done?"), Bobby Vee's hit song from the early 1960s, *Take Good Care Of My Baby*, started playing. I'd been listening to the CD in the car because Bobby Vee had recently passed away from Alzheimer's disease, aged 73.

Although a love song, the initial words, at the time, seemed so very, very relevant... a real theme song for grandparents:

My tears are falling 'cause you've taken her away
And though it really hurts me so
There's something that I've got to say
Take good care of my baby.
Please don't ever make her blue.
Just tell her that you love her.
Make sure that you're thinking of her
In everything you say and do.
Take good care of my baby.
Now don't you ever make her cry.
Just let your love surround her.
Paint rainbow all around her.
Don't let her see a cloudy sky.

Interestingly, *The Catholic Weekly*, at the time of his passing, had an article about Bobby Vee – his music and his life as a devout Catholic.

With my musical taste still "lost in the Sixties", I knew a bit about Bobby Vee. He had a string of hits from 1960-63, songs like *Rubber Ball, More Than I Can Say, Run To Him, Walkin' With My Angel, The Night Has A Thousand Eyes* and, of course, the grandparents' theme song, *Take Good Care Of My Baby.* You'd remember the songs, if you heard them!

From *The Catholic Weekly* article, Bobby Vee was a devout Catholic and a dedicated family man, married to his wife, Karen, from 1963 until her death in 2015, and a dedicated father to his four children.

He was very involved with his local community and believed in giving back to it through active involvement and generous charitable work. I knew that his career had started as a 15-year-old, when he and his band were asked to replace Buddy Holly for a scheduled concert after he had died in the famous plane crash – the "night the music died".

The article suggested that Bobby Vee never

forgot the tragedy that paved the way to his success and that perhaps it was this that kept him so humble and down-to-earth.

Anyway, back to the weekend sleepover – we did take good care of their baby! Both baby and grandparents survived the experience and we are so looking forward to the next time.

The Bark grew, not only in popularity but in size. People were keen to contribute. Julia Goff became involved and *The Bark* improved even more as the team 'cut and pasted' articles month after month, year after year.

Fate, God or good luck intervened by the name of the late Frank Golding. 


